# Introduction

#### Why is CASA so important?

An advocate is the heart of CASA Jefferson's mission. Advocates are the eyes, ears, and most importantly, the voices for abused and neglected children in the court. These Advocates are trained and supervised to gather information to make recommendations so that Judges decide the best possible outcome for the children in foster care.

Every child deserves to grow and learn in a safe and loving home. However, for thousands of children around the nation, violence, neglect, and maltreatment are all they know. Nationally, 686,000 children were found to be victims of maltreatment in 2012; 8,458 of these victims are from Louisiana.

Children whose homes are no longer safe for them to return to are placed in the confusing and oftentimes overwhelming world of foster care. That's where CASA Jefferson comes in.

Court-Appointed Special Advocates are appointed by judges to serve as the voice for children in foster care. By getting to know their assigned child and the people involved in the child's life, Advocates can fight for the best interest of the child and serve as a consistent, responsible, adult presence in their life. Through recommendations made in court, Advocates ensure that their CASA child's needs are being met and that they're not lost in our overburdened child welfare system. Children who have experienced abuse or neglect fare better with a CASA volunteer by their side. Studies have shown:

- They are more likely to find a safe, permanent home.
- They are more likely to succeed in school.
- They are half as likely to re-enter the foster care system.

#### **Research shows:**

Having a stable relationship with a supportive adult can help children do well, even when they have faced significant hardships.

- CASA volunteers are trained to understand the impact of trauma on children.
- They spend time with children and the people in their lives.
- They talk to service providers, teachers, and social workers to gather information that will help them make informed recommendations to the court.
- Based on what they learn, our volunteers also advocate for services that promote healing, that help children develop resilience without causing additional trauma.
- They encourage services that strengthen parents' relationships with their children.

# **Our Story**

## **Our Mission**

To break the cycle of child abuse and neglect through volunteers advocating for safe, nurturing, and permanent homes for foster children in our community.

### **Our Vision**

Our vision is to have volunteers recruited, trained, and assigned to every child in the foster care system in Jefferson Parish.

### **Our Purpose**

Children who are removed from their homes because of reported abuse and/or neglect and are placed in foster care situations. During a lengthy and complex process, a judge will determine where they may safely and permanently place. This is where an advocate steps in.

## **Our Goals**

The following goals have been identified by our program as performance measurements to illustrate the impact of CASA Jefferson advocates who have been appointed by the Jefferson Parish Juvenile Court to a Child in Need of Care case. Our program's ultimate goal is to ensure that children are permanently and promptly placed, as well as ensuring the children have their needs met while in foster care.

#### GOAL 1

In 2022-2023 the average time a CASA child spends in the Department of Children and Family Service's custody will be fewer than 730 days. (*As outlined in the Adoption and Safe Families Act, Public Law 105-89, of 1997*)

• In 2022-2023, **220** CASA Jefferson children spent an average of **211 days** in Department of Children and Family Service's custody.

#### GOAL 2

In 2022-2023, 80% of CASA children will achieve a permanent placement. (*Through reunification, adoption, or transfer of custody*).

• In 2022-2023, 94% of CASA Jefferson children whose case were closed received a permanent placement.

#### GOAL 3

In 2022-2023, 70% of CASA children will be placed with their siblings. (To maintain family connection)

• In 2022-2023, **76%** of CASA Jefferson children were placed with their siblings.

#### GOAL 4

In 2022-2023, 60% of recommendations made by CASA Advocates will become orders of the Court. (*Recommendations are made for services including but not limited to educational, medical, behavioral health services, family connections and permanent placements.*)

• In 2022-2023, **65%** of the recommendations made by CASA Jefferson Advocates became orders of the Court. Our Advocates made **467** recommendations, **303** of which became orders of the Court.
